A MESSAGE FROM MAYOR AMY WILCZYNSKI

May is always a fun transition time. Kids are getting prepared for finals, or gearing up for camp or summer jobs. College kids are coming home and reuniting with old friends. Parents will now have new schedules....some more hectic, some more relaxed.

We are excited to reveal the new concession stand at Crestwood Lake. It will be 'all hands on deck' during these next 2 weeks, but we have faith that we will have a reveal on opening day! We encourage all residents to join the lake; at a very reasonable price, you can support one of our most treasured jewels in town.

I hope to see everyone out at the Memorial Day parade on **Monday, May 26th**. The **parade steps off at 9:30**, the **ceremony at memorial park is at 10:15** and the **firehouse events start at 11**. The ceremony is always the most beautiful and respectful part of the day, to honor those who have served our country in the United States Armed Forces and made the ultimate sacrifice. Thank you to the Holiday Observers for continuing this very important tradition in Allendale.

Opening day for Allendale Recreation Commission (ARC) was a success at the beginning of the month. Our very own APD officer Mark Dunn threw out the first pitch. The borough is committed to the rehabilitation of our fields over the next few years. We would like to thank ARC for the collaboration and donations to help rehab field 3.

We had a budget meeting this month where we adopted our operating budget for the year. We strive to keep the tax rate on a decline year after year. Our auditor presented the budget and claimed that we were in excellent shape, especially compared to other municipalities. One important statement he made was that Allendale was always known for high taxes, however this is no longer the case. I would like to thank past administrations for their effort of fiscal conservativeness, an effort which we are proud to continue forward.

You may have noticed new signs in our downtown directing cars to municipal parking. This is the first phase to clean up and repurpose the commuter lot. We are applying for grants to help fund this.

At our most recent Mayor and Council meeting, the Chief of Police and Town Manager of Cedar Grove attended to formally recognize the outstanding police work and collaboration between their department and ours:

A highly organized burglary ring, comprised of individuals from South America who had entered the U.S. illegally with the intent to commit crimes, had been operating across the Tri-State area. This crew was exceptionally sophisticated —using police scanners, counter-surveillance tactics, cell phones, and even signal-jamming devices to avoid detection and prevent victims from calling for help. Their criminal activity stretched from Nassau and Suffolk Counties in New York, through New Jersey, and as far as Delaware and Pennsylvania. Prior to reaching our area, they had begun their operations in North Carolina and had recently targeted a home in Cedar Grove.

The Cedar Grove Police Department, working in coordination with the FBI, obtained intelligence indicating the crew was heading toward Allendale, with specific homes already marked for burglary. Once the Allendale Police Department was alerted, our officers mobilized immediately, working tirelessly around the clock. Their efforts led to the successful arrest of all 12 individuals involved. This was not just a case of catching a few burglars—it was the dismantling of an advanced, multi-state criminal enterprise.

Both the FBI and ICE commended our police department, echoing the sentiment that their work was nothing short of exceptional.

June 3rd is our next TOWN HALL. Look forward to seeing everyone there!

Be Idle Aware

Here are some idling facts:



Idling for more than 3 minutes is illegal in NJ. Any police officer can write a ticket.



Idling for more than 10 seconds wastes more gas (and your money!) than re-starting. Idling for 2 minutes is equal to 1 mile of driving—just "fuel-ish"!



Today's fuel-injected cars don't need to be "warmed-up" even when it's cold outside. They do so most efficiently when on the move.



Idling is rough on your car. It can cause a buildup of fuel residues that can damage your engine and increase fuel consumption.



Idling can make you sick!

It creates dangerous air pollutants that cause asthma, allergies, heart & lung disease, and cancer.

Spread the word to curb unnecessary idling!

Did you know that the color of your child's swimsuit could impact their safety at a swimming pool or the beach? It can, say water safety experts who have taken a close look at how the hue of swimwear may influence how visible a child is under water.

"A child's swimsuit color can significantly impact their visibility in the water, which is crucial in preventing drownings. Bright and contrasting colors stand out more clearly against the water, making it easier for lifeguards and parents to spot a child quickly, especially in an emergency situation," Bernard Fisher, director of health and safety for the American Lifeguard Association, said in an email.

"People should avoid swimsuits in light blue, gray, or green as they can blend with the water and pool surroundings, making it difficult to spot a child. We recommend bright and contrasting colors such as neon yellow, orange, pink, and bright red," Fisher added. "These colors are highly visible both underwater and on the surface."



E-mobility devices make it easier to:

- Save on gas, parking, and rideshare costs.
- Access destinations without needing to walk or drive.
- Reduce carbon emissions.
- Make "first-mile" and "last-mile" connections for bus and train trips.
- Climb hills and keep up with traffic without getting sweaty.
- Help people with limitations due to age, physical fitness levels, or disabilities.

* Restrictions may vary by agency. PATH and NJT restrict non-collapsible vehicles during peak travel times. Bus racks have limited availability and may not fit all bikes.

Low-speed e-bikes and e-scooters are regulated like bicycles. Drivers of low-speed e-bikes and e-scooters:

- Must ride in the same direction as traffic and obey all traffic lights, signs, and signals.
- Are advised to wear helmets to minimize potential head injury.
 Helmets are required in NJ for youth under age 17.
- Must park devices without blocking pedestrian and/or wheelchair access.
- Should not ride on sidewalks. Off-road trails generally do not allow motorized bicycles, but may allow e-bikes and e-scooters.
 Regulations vary by municipality and county. Check all local ordinances and policies. Ride slowly in areas with pedestrians.






