PRESENTATION - A: Governing Body: Review 2025 goals and strategy plan.

Mayor Wilczynski stated last year, we started to do strategy and goals for the counsel. This has never done in the past so we just thought all the committees, all the great work that we're doing, it would be nice to codify it and make it into a presentation for the community and bring it to the community and get their feedback on it.

The Mayor gave a presentation and showed pictures of the Borough of Allendale professionals and staff and described each committee. Mayor Wilczynski also presented the borough departments and the role for each.

Mayor Wilczynski stated that for our strategy, we are Allendale. Transparent, Accountable and Responsible Government. The reason why we're all here is to serve residents to make Allendale a better place to live for you all. We're not here for a paycheck. We are here to make Allendale a better place to live. We are all vested in this town. We all love this town. We're doing this work because we love the town. The bottom line simple is, a better place to live.

Pillars of Progress. We are fiscally conservative. We want a safe place to live. To me, this is the bottom line of everything. If you're not safe and you don't have fiscal responsibility you can't have anything else.

Character. We really want to progress a little bit, but you still want to try to preserve the town.

Environmental and Infrastructure. You have to keep up your infrastructure. We have to care about the environment and the trees and the lake and all of what makes the borough so beautiful. Recreation and Social. That's a major part of municipalities. You need the fields and the social component. It's very important in a town.

The committees that come from these are Admin/Finance/HR and IT. One of the major things we want to do is drive digital innovation. That is something that I've been very big on. We've switched to teams and we're trying to get everything automated and automating all our records. That eventually might become another committee, but right now we put it in there. Once we go through this, the council will talk about their committees a little bit more.

Best Place To Work. We want to make sure that the employees are happy. That's why we fixed the building. Happy employees will make happy residents. Good economics.

Safe place to live. We always want to support our police. We have an amazing police department. We have a new police department. We want to make sure they have everything they need to keep Allendale safe.

AVAC and the Fire Department, which are both volunteer organizations in the borough, are very important because it would be expensive if we had a paid fire department. We want to make sure that we support them. We are always trying to help them recruit. We're helping them with training and everything like that.

Character is your Land Use. Before the council meeting, we were looking at a couple codes. Things come up all the time. For example, we noticed that some people were building two stories on accessory structures and the side yard is only six feet from the neighbor, so a lot of people are building these towers and your kind of losing that space and privacy. This is something new that's come up. So, we're going to change that to give a little bit more space to the side yard. So, just things like that that really help the character of the town.

If anyone wants information on Fair Share Housing, feel free to talk to me.

Historic Preservation. Of course, that's always important.

Our Environmental and Infrastructure is our DPW and utilities; our trees, flooding. We're doing a big culvert study now because a lot of the culverts haven't been cleaned out by residents. Some, the borough cleans. We're trying to identify all of them. That will help with all the flooding from all the building that's going on in the area. We really must be cognizant of that because we've had a lot of flooding issues in the past.

Wildlife Management. Deer is an ongoing thing that I'm constantly trying to update and find the best solution for that.

Recreation and Social. Our Facilities, Parks and Recreation Committee. That's all about community engagement. It's all about recreation sports and the volunteers who run the programs.

Innovative. Thinking about better ways of doing things. We're informed. We're really trying to push information out there. Be transparent. We have town halls. We have coffee with the mayor, the council and cop. We have a weekly newsletter. There are mayor's memos that go out. We're on social media. We're out there.

Intentional. We're really trying to make sure that we have policies that are going to benefit the entire community. We do have a lot of people who come in and want speed humps, but then that will be a problem for another street. So, you have to watch that. You have to be intentional for everybody. You can't just have self-interest. Everybody has their own selfinterest. That's one thing we must do to make sure that it's very fair and that it's helping the entire community.

Inclusive. All voices are heard. We always welcome people in.

In Touch. We're transparent. We're a very hands-on borough. We're in touch with residents. We get feedback. We put surveys out there to see what people want to talk about again at town halls.

Integrity. We're doing it for the right reasons, and I think that's what makes us so successful.

The fiscally conservative is our budget. We worked on the budget today. We're going to have less than one percent municipal increase. We have been very conservative on the municipal side. If anybody knows the three components of where your tax dollar is, we're a small part of it. There's the county, which is 10 percent, the schools which are 65 percent and then we're the rest. Out of that 25 percent, we really can only control about half of that because a lot of it is statutory type stuff; insurance and things like that. Insurance went up again to 24 percent. Energy is going up. The electric bills are going up. Things keep going up. We really try very hard and start with zero-base budgeting.

Safe Place to live. I will turn it over to Councilman Matthew O'Toole.

Councilman Matthew O'Toole, Public Safety, stated that I am the head of the safety committee. I'm the chair of that committee. And, as the mayor said, most of what we do is to support our police department and our volunteer organizations. What we're planning on doing this year is continuing to support. We have a young police department. We've had some high turnover in the past few years through retirement. We have two new officers. Chief Dillon is a spectacular leader. He is guiding these young officers to really be a big part of the community and to be exemplary officers. In our fire department, we have a new fire chief there. We've done a lot to try and bring in new members. All the volunteer organizations in the area are having trouble finding members so we've done things like creating a new stipend program, putting in a new chief, and really are changing the culture of the department there to make it more attractive for people to come in. We are also here to support our Ambulance Corp and to try and bring in more recruits for them. They're doing well, but they always need more people. We've just finished a lease with them on the building which has been in the works for years. That should make them happy and get them back into the building and help them to bring in more people too.

Councilwoman Susanne Lovisolo, Land Use and Construction Code, spoke about Land Use. Our Land Use Committee meets once a month. We usually meet on Thursday morning of the second council meeting of the month. We met last Friday morning. The committee includes the mayor, Councilman Tyler Yaccarino, Andy Agugliaro, Anthony Hackett, Mike Vreeland, and Alison Altano. At the Land Use Committee, we try not to get into individual property concerns. We try and look at issues that residential property owners may have. One of the things that recently came up was accessory buildings. Our code was very outdated in regard to that with the trend towards two-story accessory buildings that a lot of people are putting on their property. So, how do we address that. I think we've come up with a good solution. Too many people have their individual property rights, but also not infringing upon the neighbor's right to not have two story buildings a couple feet from their property line. So, we look at things like that.

Other things that come out of this meeting, the shade tree committee is going to be up and running again. Former Councilman Jim Strauch is spearheading that effort which we're happy about. They'll be doing an inventory of trees in town. They're already getting to work on that.

With the warmer upon us, it's time for outdoor dining in town. One of the things we do is send out a letter to our restaurants in town reminding them that before they put out their tables and chairs and their planters and umbrellas and everything else, they do have to submit a plan to the town. That gets reviewed by Anthony Hackett who looks at it and makes sure that it's in compliance with our code. Then they get approval from him before they can put anything out there. We have a lot of crossover areas. For Land Use we will take sidewalks and streets under our purview, but that also touches on public safety. That's also definitely DPW.

We're going to start the paving program again in town. Another thing coming up is sump pumps. We have former councilwoman Jackie McSwiggan who did a herculean effort years and years ago about addressing sump pumps in town from residence's drain directly into the municipal sewer system. That's not allowed. We are going to look at that again. This is a great committee. We have a lot of fun. There's always baked goods. Mayor Wilczynski stated that one of the things we're working on now is the Fair Share Housing. We're doing a hazard vulnerability study; we're doing a masterplan and now we're doing our fair share housing plan.

Mayor Wilczynski spoke about the Department of Public Works. The DPW is basically our roads. Andy Agugliaro is new so we're instilling a road program where we have all the roads listed, the lineage of the road and then like A, B, C, D, like which ones need fixing. Paving is so expensive so you can't just pave 20 streets, so we really have to, based on the lineage of the street and how much it's going to cost, that's how we determine, and we try to spend about \$200,000 to \$250,000 a year on paving.

Potholes. We had a pothole meeting today. It's just another thing. To buy the equipment to do it, the hot asphalt is like \$60,000, so we sometimes outsource that and then sometimes we have this stuff where we kind of patch it. As I said earlier, the culvert program is also part of that flooding is becoming huge everywhere, including Allendale. We're trying to do whatever we can to clean that storm drain to make sure the culverts are cleaned out and things like that.

Utility also falls under this so that's what councilwoman Lovisolo was talking about. The sump pump program, we sold our water system so water used to be under here. That's why we switched the committees a little bit. So, we really don't have a lot to do with the water anymore. We pretty much have that wrapped up. But the sewer is another one. So that is our second highest item on our budget. It's just a little high for our small town so we are doing a study next week where we're viewing with a camera this one area where we think there's a problem with some I & I, inflow and infiltration. And then the sump pump program that we're going to kick in.

Because when we met with Northwest Bergen Sewer, they said that it is the biggest culprit in all towns. So, we haven't done it in a good ten years so we're just going to really get the message out there to make sure that we can go in and monitor to make sure that resident sump pumps aren't hooked up to their sewer line because we're paying a fortune for that.

Councilman Yaccarino, Facilities, Parks and Recreation, stated that the Facilities, Parks and Recreation is a three-prong committee. Obviously, being in borough hall I'm sure some of you noticed the great improvements that we've made, namely, Alison, really driving those. We've done improvements by painting, flooring, lighting, really some nice quality of life items for our staff, our volunteers and visitors to borough hall to make things more efficient and really look very pleasant. We have the new community center, which Amy drove that project for many years, our newest borough facility, which is here for the whole community. We're so happy to see a great many folks in town use those facilities. We're continuing to make improvements and making sure that we keep things up and up so-to-speak and to make it nice for those group they said before.

Parks, right now, of course, we have all our ballfields. We have Crestwood Lake, which is our big one. Currently, if you drive by Brookside right out front you see that Field 3, the Brookside field, is currently in the process of receiving a full end-to-end renovation and our partnership with the Allendale Recreation Commission. We're really excited about the improvements there. Our DPW has been working with the vendor who is doing Field 3 so that we can improve all our fields. Over the past few years, there's been some challenges with the fields in terms of the environment, the weather and so forth, so we're in the process of instituting, like we've done with the roads, our field maintenance program. We're working with our recreation scheduler, taking certain fields out of commission for half of the season. The DPW goes out and approves the fields and then we reopen them for the following season. We are going to be instituting that to improve our ballfields.

Crestwood Lake, right now our big project is the concession stand, which has been a longtime coming. We're excited to be opening that up for our Crestwood members this summer. Amy has been part of that project. Alison has been a big part of that project as well as our engineer, architect and builder. That's going to be a great amenity for our members there.

Our next big long-term project for Crestwood Lake, which we'll probably start planning in 2026, is going to be our tennis courts up at the Red Barn. Pickle ball has been a big sport, so we're really going to look to work with the recreation commission to optimize that area, making sure that we're offering pickleball, basketball, tennis and the high school lacrosse program also may be incorporating a Lacrosse wall, if we can make that happen as well. There's a lot of things happening now, but we're working through it and I'm thankful for the support of everybody in making these projects happen.

The council thanked the mayor for all her hard work.

Mayor Wilczynski completed her presentation.

PRESENTATION - B:

A. Library Update: Nancy Clauss

Nancy Clauss thanked the mayor and council for giving her an opportunity to present this overview to bring everyone up on their operations.

Nancy stated that she wants to address a question that comes up every now and then and that is why do people still need libraries. She said it's a common misconception that libraries are becoming obsolete due to the rise of digital materials and content and all the access to online information. Personally, I work in a library, so I rarely hear it because people who are in libraries generally understand what libraries do and the value of the library. However, usually when I hear that kind of a thing, it's somebody who really hasn't been in a library for many years, so they don't necessarily know how we've changed and how we are addressing the needs of the community.

Nancy Clauss gave the following 2024 Year Review on the Lee Memorial Library.

We collaborated with the Ho-Ho-Kus library to create a new neighborhood book club. This club meets outside the library, and we are trying to create a little bit more of a relaxed environment. We're trying to provide book titles that are not your typical club fair. So, just having people stretch and read things that they wouldn't normally read. It's been very successful. We're approaching our one-year anniversary of that.

We have our therapy dog who comes every week. He's helped many, many children not only overcome their fear of dogs, but also their reluctance to read because they read to him.

But the one I'm very proud of is our dementia caregivers' group. We started that about two years ago in a partnership with Altheimer's of New Jersey. Sadly, it's an important need and it's a growing need. And, in fact, we have one group who meets once a month and recently a group who maxed out in size. They can only have maybe 10 or 12 people at a time. So, now we have a waiting list for that group. I've been working with Altheimer's of New Jersey to create a second group. One of the other groups may want to meet twice a month and then we may add another once-a-month group. So, it's a very important resource for people in the area.

We have tech time. We have the National Honor Society students come on Tuesday. If you're interested and you need some help with cell phone, computers or little things, they help. Going forward in 2025, we are going to be working with Mike in the Police Department and Stew Leonard's for a water safety program. It's going to be held in May with Stewie the Duck, which is the store mascot for the organization.

Nancy Clauss presented a slide slow of some of the things they've done in the library.

Nancy Clauss said there's a lot more coming in 2025. One of the big things that we're doing is extending our service hours. So, we currently open 54 hours a week. We're going to be moving to 62. We're going to be opening on Wednesday nights and Sundays. There was a survey done a couple of years ago and that was one of the things that came out and we want to make it happen going forward. It's going to be 12 to 4 on Sundays between the school year. We won't have those hours in the summer, but for the rest of the year we will have those hours. And then Wednesday night is great because we can provide programming to the public. I think earlier we alluded to some kind of news about fines for books. Effective April 2nd, the Lee Memorial Library will be fine free, which is something that is going on in many libraries around the country, but specifically, the libraries immediately surrounding Allendale. It's been very successful in other libraries, and some have been doing it for two or three years. They found that it makes it much more welcoming for people. It relieves barriers from people to come in and borrow things. It's just the right thing to do. We are also looking at physical changes to the first floor. We call it the year of the refresh. With the electrical work behind us, now, we're ready to start to move on with some other cosmetic changes. One is going to be very soon. We'll be painting the whole first floor. And laying new carpet throughout the first floor, except for the kid's room. Basically, the kids' room carpet is not that old and it's still in good shape.

We're going to be adding new furniture and desks, and computers in the main room. And, recently, the borough created a recycling center outside. It used to be in the little hallway as you go up to the Quilt Room. That's in the process of being moved outside and that's going to enable us to refurbish that area. We are hoping to be able to put in a locked cage area.

We are going to be upgrading the Wi-Fi on our side of the building.

Nancy discussed some newly expanded services for 2025 and ended her presentation with a short video.

Councilwoman Lovisolo thanked Nancy for presenting tonight and letting us all know how important the library is to Allendale and everything that you guys do for us. Thank you.

Mayor Wilczynski stated before the approval of the Consent Agenda she forgot to talk about Resolution approving the Consent Order. This is something very important. This is also something that just shows that we are always thinking and trying to innovate. This is a property that was on our low-income roster, if you will, and it became just destroyed by the people who lived there. We worked something out with the bank, so we have Allendale Housing, Inc., which is the organization that oversees our special needs housing, is going to take over the property and we're hoping to regenerate that into our fair share housing numbers.

Council Committee Reports

Councilman Yaccarino, Facilities, Parks and Recreation/ Land Use and Construction Code, stated that he gave a pretty good overview earlier. We had two or three meetings this week touching up on a wide range of topics; concession stand, Red Barn, events for the year. So, we're getting ready for spring and summer. Things are in motion.

Councilman Matthew O'Toole, Public Safety, stated that the committee met on Tuesday. We had a change of venue. Chief Dillon thought it would be nice to do it at the new community center, so it was a nice change of pace. He provided us with an update on our two new hires. We're looking to have the swearing in at one of our April meetings. Lieutenant Griffith updated us on some signage around town. Some parking, including our new five-minute parking spot in front of Terri O'Connell for people who are picking up food or for food delivery services. Hopefully, this will cut down on people stopping in the middle of the road or double parking or using the handicap spot to just run in to stores. A quick reminder that overnight parking is prohibited in the borough. A great job by the fire department and our mutual aid partners extinguishing a house fire on Hillside Ave last week. Chief Andersen reported at the meeting that about 50 percent of the time we're getting both trucks out, which is great, but they can always use more people. Anyone interested in becoming a member of the fire department stop by the fire house during their monthly meeting. Police Chief, Mike Dillon, stated that the meetings are every Thursday evening starting at 7:30 and then every second Friday. Congratulations to all the officers who are going to be installed tomorrow night. Chief Bottaro reports that they are doing well, but they can also use help. They are a great group of people. They have a lot of great events every year including their upcoming beefsteak and scavenger hunt at Guardian Angel on March 29th. You can find information about tickets on Facebook or on allendaleambulance.org. Finally, the Gary Letizia Memorial Blood Drive will once again be held at the firehouse on Thursday, March 27th. Reservations can be made online, or walk-ins are always happily accepted. Please come out and donate. This drive is growing and growing and it's helping to put a lot of much needed blood back into the system. Every drop counts, so please come out and roll up your sleeves for us.

Councilwoman Susanne Lovisolo, Finance, Human Resources, Administration and Information Technology, Land Use and Construction Code, stated that she touched on a lot of things earlier. We had our Land Use meeting last Friday. Yesterday morning we had our Fair Share Housing huddle. Allendale has really been ahead of the curb on this a lot, and it just seems like every year they just reshuffle the deck and add to our numbers. I am very happy with the team we have in place and everything that we're doing to provide affordable housing as best we can with some astronomical numbers handed to us.

This morning, we had our finance meeting. We were able to look at our budget for the upcoming year. We reviewed our expenses and revenue from last year and, based on projections and estimates going forward and as always, Alison has done an amazing job with spearheading all of that. I want to add to Matt and backing up the blood drive. I think I have been going since you and your friends started it in town. He's fantastic and it's wonderful. Our residents really do come out.

The Green Team is going to be having our spring cleaning and environmental day on Saturday, May 3rd. It will be a day of being able to drop off styrofoam and electronic recycling, as well as clothing and shredding. It's a great service that the borough and The Green Team provide for our residents.

Councilman Edward O'Connell, Facilities, Parks and Recreation, stated that I continue to work with our scouts to try to get them to completion with their Eagle project. I had a couple of visits with Cian with her receptacles for the lake, so we made a couple changes there. She's going to improve upon that. We're working with Jacob for a wall behind the firepit to be built to hang some plaques on and Joshua is going to have a demonstration for fire safety, a two-day demonstration. We continue working on that. Once I get the dates for that demonstration I'll announce it at a council meeting.

<u>Staff Reports:</u>

Linda Louise Cervino, Municipal Clerk, stated that the compost permit registration opened yesterday. The compost center will be open on Wednesdays and Saturdays starting April 5th. This morning, I spoke with the New Jersey Film Commission representative, and we went over the Filming Ordinance, specifically the fees, to see if the Borough would like to be Film Ready. At this time, we decided that Film Ready will not benefit us. Dottie had investigated having the Satellite Office and Passport Outreach Services available one day soon at the Community Center in the future.

Michael Dillon, Police Chief, stated that it's a busy time at the police department. We're working to onboard two new officers, renew our accreditation status, new training and equipment as well as establishing a program that puts a mental health professional in our police station a few times a week to assist with community outreach. We are also looking at options for dispatch as we are in need of high-cost upgrades. Now is the time we should look to leverage regional technology while staying physically responsible for the borough in providing the level of service the residents expect.

Ray Wiss, Borough Attorney, stated that a lot of what we've been involved in in the last two weeks are matters that have been referenced in the reports from the council this evening. But I think one of the biggest time consumers that the mayor and I have been in constant contact with is the affordable housing and related litigations that we have with our neighbors in Saddle River. Obviously, the Allendale sewer system is a very valuable commodity that serves the residence. Our neighbors do not have that type of infrastructure. We want to prioritize Allendale residents and Allendale developments over those adjacent municipalities. So, there is a large interplay between our affordable housing litigation and the matters involving our sewer infrastructure. There are a couple court proceedings pending, most recently this morning, back and forth on Tuesday afternoon and they will develop over time.

TJ has certainly been working on OPRA requests, some of them related to what I just talked about. Also, the cell towers have been a fiscal source which is a benefit to the borough. Working with the committee, we have ongoing PD negotiations on a new contract. This morning, we had the ongoing telephone conference with Veolia. As was mentioned, the water utility has been sold, but there's a lot of follow up to that in terms of easements and conveyances and that has been an ongoing thing. We meet with Veolia once every other week.

The Municipal Clerk, Linda Cervino, reminded everyone that the primary election for 2025 has been moved to June 10, 2025. The last date to register to vote in the primary election is May 20, 2025, and the Clerk's Office only, will be open until 9:00 p.m.

MAYOR'S REPORT:

Mayor Wilczynski gave her report. She stated that the community center is always top of mind. I just wanted to thank all the residents for their patience as we roll this out. This was something that we've never endeavored before, and it really is working out great. It is being used all the time. As Dottie was saying, we are trying to bring in some programs for residents. We're there to manage the space. We're not going to be recreation directors, but we are trying to bring some educational services for residents. I have a lot of memos coming out. There's a big memo on Fair Share Housing that we'll be sending out to everybody, so people get an idea of what we're going through. That is taking up so much time and effort of the borough. I feel like we have a solid team and we're doing everything that we can. We just learned today that some towns are not doing anything and then they're stuck. We have been very proactive. We had this team months before we even got our numbers.

There's also going to be a Mayor's Memo coming out on our new website. We're not ready to launch it yet because there's still some quirks. That is going to be user-friendly for the community and I'm very excited about that.

There will be another Mayor's Memo on the community center. Regarding the cell towers, we're proud of it. Cell towers have a lease and on the actual cell tower you rent out space. We had a third-party company that was managing it. There was a contract for over 30 years. When the 30 years is up a lot of times you take it and just roll it back over. That's when I became a new mayor. I wanted to learn about it. Alison, our CFO and Ray and TJ, decided not to roll it over again and take it over. We are getting significant revenue that would otherwise go to a third party.

PUBLIC COMMENTS ON ANY MATTER:

Jim Wright of Franklin Turnpike, Allendale stated that one of the reasons I'm here is I want to change the name of the Franklin Turnpike. I want to change it from being an honor of William Franklin, the last royalist governor and traitor, and change the name to honor Benjamin Franklin. So, we just need a resolution saying this Franklin Turnpike in Allendale will henceforth be named after Benjamin Franklin, not the traitor's son. We have the 250th Anniversary of the Revolutionary War coming up. And William Franklin was a nasty traitor.

We've had red shoulder hawks nesting in town for over 20 years. They are endangered species. They nest all over town. We hear them calling. Hoboken just made the Common Tern their official city bird and I thought it would be great if Allendale made red shoulder hawks the official borough raptor.

Walter Widmer, 38 Hamilton Street, Allendale stated that he's been exposed to three mayors in this town. I want to compliment you on being outstanding. Mayor Wilczynski thanked Mr. Widmer. The borough staff are fantastic.

Mr. Widmer wanted to know about the group breaking into the homes in Allendale. Police Chief Mike Dillon said that has always been an issue. Not just for Allendale, but for every jurisdiction. Basically, people from outside the borough come into the town to break into houses. We've recently arrested six burglars who originated from South America. And with the help of the federal government, we were able to apprehend six of them while they were in town. We stopped them because we responded with a very robust police response, and they never had time to burglarize a house in Allendale.

Mr. Widmer asked what's happening with the mural. Mayor Wilczynski stated that it's going up around May.

ADJOURNMENT:

There being no further business to come before the Mayor and Council, on a motion by Councilman Yaccarino, second by Councilwoman Lovisolo and unanimously carried, the meeting was adjourned at 8:16 p.m.

Start: 1:30 - 3:30 PM January 6th End: 12:30 - 1:30 PM January 7th

Snow was gradual in starting as it began lightly from southwest to northeast 1:30 - 3:30 PM January 6th with temperatures 32 - 36 degrees. The intensity of the snow increased late afternoon and especially during the evening as the snow became wet and heavy at times. Those that were in the mid 30s saw the temperature fall a few degrees. From 10 PM - 1 AM, the precipitation became lighter and started mixing with sleet and rain. Gradually this tapered to a drizzle for the pre-dawn hours. While a wintry mix continued further west in the state, this area just saw pockets of drizzle as temps rose to 35 - 37 degrees. The final piece of this storm came through after daybreak on the 7th as precipitation re-developed and changed to a brief period of snow for the mid to late morning (though with temperatures still above freezing).
