We are very fortunate to be ahead of the curve with this process that is affecting more than half the municipalities across the nation. PSE&G is wrapping up its pipe replacement project to improve its infrastructure. Thanks to all residents for their patience through these very important improvements.

Veolia - Lead Service Line Project

Veolia is in Allendale as part of its sweeping, \$159 million project to protect residents by removing lead from the system.



Beginning Monday, August 14, 2023, crews will be working to determine Beginning Monday, August 14, 2023, crews will be working to determine whether homes along 10 streets have a lead service line. This may include some digging, but representatives may also ask for access to the meter of some residents. The company will restore any areas that are disturbed during this process.

If lead is found, Veolia will remove it *AT NO COST TO THE HOMEOWNER*.

During this project, J. Fletcher Creamer & Son, Inc. (Creamer), a Veolia partner will be working on streets in Allendale. To stay up to date on the upcoming work visit the Borough's Website (<u>www.allendalenj.gov</u>).

Since 2019, Veolia has had more than a dozen crews working every day to replace lead service lines, the pipes from run from the main in the street to an individual home. 220/230 West Crescent Update

(formerly Black Millwork)



I am happy to share that the Borough has gone out to bid for the community center and if all goes well, we will have a builder by the end of the month and start construction within the next few months.

For clarification, the 70 rental units that you see up now at 220 WC will be at the back of the building. Our community center is the front façade of the building. This is why there are no windows facing the West Crescent side.

The community center will have a large meeting/community room with a kitchenette on one side and a gym with a larger commercial kitchen on the other side. The facility will serve the entire community from our toddlers to our seniors. The municipal offices and library will remain at 500 WC.

It is also important to know that we are very fortunate to have only 70 units at this site. The Borough acquired the entire property from a Brooklyn based developer who was known to build high density housing.


In addition, when we went to sell the property and go to bid, the other bidders proposed hundreds of units and another proposal with up to 300.

We were able to negotiate this deal because we were one of only 6 municipalities out of 566, who received certifications for all 3 rounds for Fair Share Housing (formally called Mt Laurel and COAH)

Because of vision and good planning, we didn't have to build super high density like our neighboring towns. For example

- Montvale- 1000+
- Mahwah- 800 +
- Old Tappan- 229
- USR- 200 +
- SR 277 w/187 affordable
- Park Ridge -800

While we all would rather see no rentals/ condos, this is the reality we live in now with Fair Share Housing obligations. We



are fortunate and I am proud that we were able to negotiate this deal as well as carve out space for a community center, something we desperately need and were very close to not having.

I have personally worked hard on this project since 2018 with many ups and downs and COVID in the middle. I know in my heart that this is the best deal for the community and will continue to work hard to get the community center built.

ALLENDALE HISTORY FRED LITT BOROUGH HISTORIAN

ALLENDALE POLICE DEPARTMENT



In this June 1928 autographed image from William Reimer to borough clerk George Wilson, Allendale's first and newly appointed chief of police William J. Reimer (right) stands in front of the Allendale firehouse (which served as the borough hall), with, from left to right, marshals Jay Hollenback (badge three), Mills Ackerson (badge one), and Jack Hogan (badge two).

In 1895, Allendale's first elected mayor and council appointed James Linkroum as the borough marshal. He was paid \$25 for the year and provided with a badge and handcuffs. In 1928, the council established the Allendale Police Department (APD) with William J. Reimer as the chief of police. With accusations of bullying and cronyism, the council voted to disband the police department on March 14, 1939, and the marshal system returned. On January 3, 1959, the mayor and council voted to reestablish the Allendale Police Department, appointing Robert D. Wilson as chief of police and Frank A. Parenti Jr. as police sergeant. Upon Chief Wilson's retirement, Frank Parenti was sworn in as police chief on June 1, 1967. Anne Kanze became APD's first female officer on August 9, 1979, and in 1980, the K-9 unit was established with officer Andrew Baum working with his new partner Guardian, a German shepherd. Robert Herndon and George "Chip"

Scherb followed Parenti as police chief on January 4, 1990, and May 12, 2011, respectively. Michael Dillon was appointed Allendale's newest police chief on January 3, 2022.

The police chief's home typically served as police headquarters. Chief marshal Kenneth Booth's home on West Maple Avenue was considered police headquarters during his tenure in the 1940s.

The first Public Safety Office was established in 1951 across from the Allendale Hotel at 126 West Allendale Avenue. In 1961, the borough took possession of the American Legion's War Memorial Building on Franklin Turnpike, providing space on the first floor for APD. In 1971, the APD rented a private home at 59 Cottage Place, remaining there until 1978, when the department moved back into 290 Franklin Turnpike after the borough administration moved to 500 West Crescent Avenue. The building at 290 Franklin Turnpike was razed in 2005, and a new 9,000-square-foot police headquarters was dedicated on the same site on November 11, 2006.

SPOTTER LATERNFLY INFORMATION

Spotted Lanternfly (SLF), Lycorma delicatula, is an invasive planthopper native to China, India, and Vietnam; it is also established in South Korea, Japan and the U.S. It was first discovered in the U.S. in Pennsylvania in Berks County in 2014 and has spread to other counties in PA, as well as the states of New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, New York, Connecticut and Ohio.

This insect has the potential to greatly impact agricultural crops and hardwood trees. SLF feeds on the plant sap of many different plants including grapevines, maples, black walnut, and other important plants in NJ. While it does not harm humans or animals, it can reduce the quality of life for people living in heavily infested areas.



WHY YOU SHOULD CARE

SLF is a serious invasive pest with a healthy appetite for our plants and it can be a significant nuisance, affecting the quality of life and enjoyment of the outdoors. The spotted lanternfly uses its piercing-sucking mouthpart to feed on sap from over 70 different plant species. It has a strong preference for economically important plants and the feeding damage significantly stresses the plants which can lead to decreased health and potentially death.

As SLF feeds, the insect excretes honeydew (a sugary substance) which can attract bees, wasps, and other insects. The honeydew also builds up and promotes the growth for sooty mold (fungi), which can cover the plant, forest understories, patio furniture, cars, and anything else found below SLF feeding.



GARBAGE & RECYCLING REMINDERS

- All items should be put out *starting at 6pm the night before* the scheduled collection.
- Building materials and wood pallets *are not collected* by our garbage contractor. You must make your own arrangements to dispose of them.
- You must schedule a one-time, courtesy move-out pickup with <u>info@AllendaleNJ.gov</u> at <u>least</u> 4 WEEKS in advance. No metal, electronics, or recyclable materials collected.

Remember to make sure that the lids are securely on top of your cans, especially garbage. This

will help keep wildlife at bay.

- Collection containers can be no larger than 30 gallons.
- Bulk Trash must be placed on the curb and **not placed** in the road.
- Food containers being recycled need to be rinsed and cleaned before you dispose.
- Soiled pizza boxes are garbage and NOT recyclable.

- Household kitchen, office and bathroom Container One:
- Styrofoam

BULKY TRASH

- Furniture
- Carpeting
- Non-metal items
- Windows/mirrors/pane glass must be taped with an "X'

METAL

- Anything that is least 75% metal
- Artificial Holiday Trees

- Newspapers and inserts
- Junk mail, envelopes, office, notebook, construction paper
- Smooth and corrugated cardboard
- Glossy magazines and catalogs
- Soft covered books and telephone books
- Non-metallic wrapping paper and greeting
- Shredded paper
- Brown grocery bags

- Food and beverage containers
- Plastic containers with a recycling code 1,
- Aluminum cans, foil
- Aseptic packaging (ex: soup, milk containers)
 - Metal cans and empty aerosol cans
- Green, clear and brown glass bottles and jars
