Veolia started the installation of the temporary PFOS filtration system on New Street last month. The anticipated finish date is around Labor Day and this system will be in place for approximately 3 years while the permanent system is being built.

PSE&G continues with its pipe replacement project throughout town. Residents will receive notification in advance if their street is affected and communication between all parties has been successful.

Lee Memorial Library hosted over 100 residents at their 'Newcomers Meet & Greet'. We have had an influx of new residents since Covid and this was a great opportunity for our new neighbors to meet and learn about the library and other organizations in town. He was funny, genuine, charming, and kind. He was a friend and I will miss him.



220/230 West Crescent Update

(formerly Black Millwork)

The building of the 70 rentals at 220 West Crescent Ave (front portion of Black Millwork) is going up at lightning speed. You can see the units and the courtyard from the street. The rental units are owned and operated by Hampshire. Residents who are interested to rent a unit are sending in their names and I am happy to pass this list on to the developer. I do not have prices at this time.



The Borough's Community Center will be directly in front (actually attached) to these rentals. The Borough will own our Community Center and owns the land that it sits on.

The building of the new Municipal Community Center will commence once the Borough goes to bid, we are so close!

The entire facility at 220 West Crescent will be a community center with one half being a gym for fitness and physical activity and the other half being an open space for

meetings. There will also be a commercial kitchen. The building will be one story now and skillfully designed with optionality, meaning, if a second story ever needs to be added in the future, it can be easily adapted.

The current administrative and building offices at Borough Hall at 500 W. Crescent will remain there as well as the Borough Council Chambers. Lee Memorial Library will also remain in its space at 500 W. Crescent.

We are also navigating through a \$750,000 HUD grant that we received from the state to help offset costs.

The Borough closed on the back building (230 West Crescent) last year which currently functions as a small warehouse.

All tree removals, whether dead or alive, for trees 6 inches in diameter or more at a height of 4 feet, require a permit.

Boy Scout Ben Peare is currently a Life Scout and Eagle Scout Candidate from Troop 59 in Allendale. He is asking for donations for his Eagle Scout Project. For this project, he is going to be constructing historical markers for the following sites, all located in Allendale:

- The John Fell House
- The Tollgate House Well on Franklin Turnpike
- Recreation Park where it's rumored that Babe Ruth once played in a baseball game and smashed a home run into the scoreboard
- The Crestwood Lake Swingset that dates back to the 1930's
- And the site in downtown Allendale where the trolley tracks used to be when there was a trolley that ran on a regular basis

The markers will consist of a post, anchored into the ground, and a wood base with a plaque resting on top. On the plaque will be a write-up of some of the history of the site and a picture.

"Allendale may be a small town, but it is rich in history and many residents aren't aware of all the cool things that have happened here and existed over the years. I also intend to reach out to Hillside and Brookside Schools, the grammar and middle school, and let them know once my project is complete so that when they do their walk-around Allendale tours they'll be sure to include these sites." Said Ben



ALLENDALE AMBULANCE CORPS SERVING SINCE 1937

May 21 - 27 is EMS Week. This year, the national theme is "Where **Emergency Care** Begins" and allows you to pause to thank paramedics, EMTs and the EMS workforce for their service.

The men and women who volunteer in the Allendale Volunteer Ambulance Corps are merely a phone call away when help is needed most. And even when situations are dangerous, tense—even dire—our EMTs and crew seem unflappable and know just what to do because they are well trained and experienced.

However, we don't work alone. The Emergency Medical system has a huge variety of services: From the doctors and nurses in emergency rooms and trauma centers, to the EMTs, and paramedics who undergo thousands of hours of training in life-saving tactics and protocols. These medical professionals all have specific emergency training that is absolutely essential. EMS teams also include ambulance drivers, helicopter pilots, police, dispatchers, and numerous other professionals.

If you have ever had a medical emergency, you already know how important and helpful the Allendale Ambulance Corps is. When someone is suffering a life-threatening trauma, the first few minutes are critical and can be the difference between life and death. Each year, the effective action of our Corps and the EMS system we partner with can stabilize a person's condition—and even resuscitate them—while they transport the patient to a hospital or trauma center for more advanced care.

ALLENDALE HISTORY FRED LITT BOROUGH HISTORIAN

ALLENDALE POST OFFICE



Allendale rail station at Erie Plaza, circa 1910. Notice Post Office sign on building.

Upon the opening of the new train depot in 1848, Allendale still had no post office. The mail was given to the railroad

station agent and you called for it. The United States Post Office in Allendale was officially established on November 11, 1869. It was located in the Erie Railroad Station and the Station Master, Smith Roswell, was also the Postmaster. Roswell served as Postmaster for 20 years.

In 1889 R. V. Ackerman, grandfather of Mrs. Herbert Winter, became Postmaster. Mrs. C. D. Mallinson, Mr. Ackerman's daughter, said she could remember sorting and distributing

mail in her father's general store, which adjoined the Ackerman home on Allendale Avenue, now Park Avenue. These were the days of pot-bellied stoves and cracker barrels in the general store.

The next site of the Post Office was where the Allendale Hotel now stands. Louis Rossner was Postmaster. Mr. Rossner was appointed by John Wanamaker, Postmaster General, in 1889. He served for two years, and then H. Upham had charge for one year.

This brings us to 1893, when S. J. Van Blarcom was appointed. No records are available to tell us where the Post Office was during his term. In 1897 A. Krause was appointed, and again the Railroad Station served as Post Office. The station was then on the east side of the tracks and here Mr. Krause served for three years.

Then, in 1902, while M. McDermott was Postmaster, the Station was moved across the tracks to its present location and the Post Office was taken along. Mr. McDermott served from 1902 to 1914. John W. Winter took over in 1914 and the Office was moved to a portion of the Winter & Christopher Store, then located where our present Office is situated. During the years from 1886 to 1917, Abe Ackerman carted mail from the Allendale Post Office to Saddle River, 31 years of continuous service. In 1920 Postmaster W. G. Z. Critchley had the Office moved to 79 West Allendale Avenue. Allendale's only Postmistress, Louise Kelly, was appointed in 1936 and the Office was moved to the west portion of the Winter Bros. building where it remained until the spring of 1963. Mrs. Kelly was followed by her husband, John J. Kelly, in 1938, then Frank A. Farrell, 1942-1959. William Anderson was acting Postmaster until 1960, when Charles H. Schubert, took over.

At special dedication services on Saturday, June 8, 1963, at 2:00 PM, the present building was opened for business with a total of fifteen employees. Representative William B. Widnall (R., Seventh District) was the featured speaker. Mayor Robert I. Newman and Postal Services Officer William Popaca also spoke. The new building is next door to the previous post office which served the borough for 27 years; The new building is twice as large. The post office was opened for business on May 27th.

GARBAGE & RECYCLING REMINDERS

- All items should be put out *starting at 6pm the night before* the scheduled collection.
- Building materials and wood pallets *are not collected* by our garbage contractor. You must make your own arrangements to dispose of them.
- You must schedule a one-time, courtesy move-out pickup with <u>info@AllendaleNJ.gov</u> at <u>least</u> 4 WEEKS in advance. No metal, electronics, or recyclable materials collected.

Remember to make sure that the lids are securely on top of your cans, especially garbage. This

will help keep wildlife at bay.

- Collection containers can be no larger than 30 gallons.
- Bulk Trash must be placed on the curb and **not placed** in the road.
- Food containers being recycled need to be rinsed and cleaned before you dispose.
- Soiled pizza boxes are garbage and NOT recyclable.

- Furniture
- Carpeting
